SWITCHING MAJORS IS LESS LIKELY IN HIGH-GRIT STUDENTS

The total self-report grit score inversely predicts change in major. Less gritty individuals are less likely to know what they want to study, and/or more likely to change their intended major. The grit sub score, **consistency of interest**, predicts likelihood of changing major.¹

WITH A CAREER PATH ALREADY CHOSEN, GRITTIER STUDENTS WERE MORE LIKELY TO PUT IN A CONCENTRATED EFFORT TO ACHIEVE THEIR GOAL.²
